# **Course Description**

Third grade students keep records of observations without making alterations. They add and subtract whole numbers mentally, on paper, and with a calculator. They observe, construct, and measure objects using ordinary hand tools. Third graders observe things with many parts and describe the ways in which the parts influence or interact with one another. They represent objects in the real world with geometric figures, number sequences, graphs, diagrams, maps, and stories. They explain how the representations do not match their real world counterparts. Third graders know that safety is a fundamental concern in all experimental science.
